Religious Education

As we begin the second week of Lent, we reflect on the Gospel passage for last Sunday 17th March, The Transfiguration.

"Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up the mountain to pray. As he prayed, the aspect of his face was changed and his clothing became brilliant as lightening . . . A cloud came and covered him with shadow; and when they went into the cloud the disciples were afraid. And a voice came from the cloud saying, "This is my Son, the Chosen One. Listen to him." Luke 9:28-29;34-35.

We often think of Lent being a time to give something up that we enjoy. It usually ends up being chocolate or something that's not so great for us anyway. In this way, are we really making a sacrifice? Lent is more than just a time of self-denial and abstaining, it is also a time for contemplation and wonder. House Points are no longer be just accumulated at the College Carnivals. Students are now able to earn points for their particular House in a variety of different ways in the day-to-day happenings at school. This competition will be known as the Emmaus Cup.

The idea is to create a competitive spirit amongst the Houses outside the normal Athletics and Swimming Carnivals where students will develop a stronger connection to their House. This in turn will further build on the strong connections between students and build a strong sense of community here at the College.

Year 7 Camp

It all started on Monday 25th February. The camp directors at the Great Aussie Bush Camp thought they would have a relaxed week. Little did they know that students from Emmaus Catholic College (ECC) were one of the most vivacious groups they would ever meet.

After the bus ride to reach their camp, the students raced to secure their places on top bunks. Many emerged victoriously and those that didn't made sure they were first in line to get their snow cones.

The students all participated in a large range of activities, nothing would slow them down. Group leaders were impressed as frisbees were tossed, hitting their targets with deadly accuracy. Mock Trial

The Emmaus Mock Trial team participated in Round 1 of the NSW Law Society Mock Trial competition on Monday 18th March against Norwest Christian College. The case was about break and enter and theft of electronic video games, with Emmaus playing the role of the prosecution. The team were well prepared but nervous, as for most students, it was their first time competing in this competition.

Barristers deliver an opening and closing address to the court, with solicitors preparing notes and advising the barristers. Witnesses rehearse and learn their script, ready to proceed without any notes during the trial plus face the extensive questions from the opposition!

The end result of the trial was 119-137, with Norwest successful this round.

Year 7 Archaeological Digs

Year 7 have had a great learning experience in their history classes over the past few weeks. **Ms McQueen's 7.1** class has been using the sandpits to recreate the experiences and expertise of real life archaeologists. They were digging for lost treasure and going through a process of meticulously uncovering what they had found.

Miss Bozic's 7.5 History class had a brilliant time completing an archaeological dig using cupcakes. In this experience students saw how an archaeologist would experience the deterioration of a site by using melting chocolate that dissolved the marshmallows as an example of how, in real life, this could link to materials deteriorating due to conditions (heat, rain, etc.) and how time can affect artefacts. Students also used pre-made icing pens to draw the grid system on their cupcakes and used skewers to 'dig' through their cupcake.

Thank you to these teachers for the time they have put into working on these tasks and for the wonderful learning experience.














Within Science, is learning about the Periodic table and how chemical react. During this time we have been conducting several practical activities. Another great thing we have been learning in science are metals and nonmetals, we have also been conducting practicals on these chemical.

For example if the metals do or do not float or if the metals dissolve. In the image below it is a piece of magnesium in hydrochloric acid. What is happening is the magnesium is reacting to the acid. This demonstration can be used to illustrate the characteristic reaction of metals with acid, a single replacement reaction, or to demonstrate the time of hydrogen gas.
