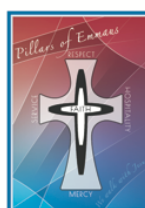

"Transforming Learning: from Curiosity to Clarity"

My theme at last week's College assembly centered on the message that **'Education is a gift that no one can take away'** and it was particularly relevant given Year 12's were just coming off recently completing their Trial HSC exams and now have only 5 weeks remaining before they graduate and commence their final Higher School Certificate examinations. Their last thirteen years of schooling I know, has been a wonderful experience and indeed a gift that will now set them up so very well for the future. As a College community we now really look forward to these last weeks with Year 12, a time of mixed emotions and consolidation, keep the faith and keep focused Year 12, you are all in our thoughts and prayers.

I indicated at the assembly that the word "**education**" is **derived** from the Latin word *educātiō* (meaning a breeding, a bringing up, a rearing) and from the Latin *educō* (meaning I educate, I train) which is directly related to the homonym *educō* (meaning I lead forth, I take out, I raise up, I build).

"Education is at its very essence designed for improving the lives of oneself and others and for leaving your community and world in a better place than what you found it in."— a quote by Marian Wright Edelman an American activist for children's rights.

I told the students that we know that education is the collective knowledge of a person and should be considered a necessity, given for one of a better word that it is a weapon which should be utilised and maximised at all times because as you know from the saying that knowledge is power, power to overcome anything. I used the Business Studies analogy where we can say that education should be considered an asset which adds to your life's economy and nobody can take this asset from you, it's an investment for now and for the future and it should be treasured.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The case involving Cardinal Pell on historic child sexual abuse crimes has again dominated the media and public discourse following the appeal decision that was handed down today.

We respect that decision and the process of law.

We know that for some, this case has reopened existing wounds and past traumas. I want to reiterate our support to the victims of abuse and to all those who are hurting.

As the Bishop of Parramatta with responsibility for the Catholic Church in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains, I remain absolutely committed to protecting children in our care from harm.

I am determined to enable survivors of abuse to have a voice and are responded to in a caring, practical, and meaningful way.

Catholic parish communities in the Diocese of Parramatta have support mechanisms in place to help those in need.

At a parish level, I would encourage you to reach out to your parish priest for help.

At a diocesan level, we strongly encourage anyone who has been affected by abuse from within the Catholic Church to contact the Diocese of Parramatta via our Office of Safeguarding & Professional Standards on (02) 8838 3419 or safeguarding@parracatholic.org.

Any concerns or allegations about any criminal offence should be reported to NSW Police on 131 444.

Men Of Honour

A new wellbeing initiative that has been introduced at the College is a program called 'Men Of Honour'.

The program has been designed to help tackle some of the alarming statistics that face boys in relation to mental health and negative behaviour. Both of these issues are becoming an increasing problem for our young men and indicate that they are in need of greater support.

Male students from Years 9 and 10 get together twice a week to complete workshops and physical training sessions. The workshops focus on team building, aspects of wellbeing and teach the boys a holistic approach to health. The young men are put through their paces as they work together to complete physical training sessions. A range of other experiences are also offered in an effort to assist the young men to make better decisions and life long healthy habits.

Some of the benefits that have already come out of the program include:

- An opportunity to mix with boys of a similar age who are experiencing similar issues in a supportive team atmosphere
- Greater engagement at school
- Developing positive relationships with both peers and teachers
- Better understanding when it comes to different health choices
- Building life skills that the boys can rely upon whilst at school and into their futures
- Making commitments that are challenging and gives a feeling of accomplishment once completed.
- Another support structure the boys are able to turn to and lean on.

The program is run once a week for the entirety of the term, with approximately 25 students being offered the opportunity to be a part of the program. At the completion of the program some of the young men are invited back to mentor some of the other young men going through the program.

Season 3 Representative Sport:

Students are to change into their jersey at lunch time before departing the College.

Sport selections for Term 4 will take place in Week 8. Students can find information about the Sports on offer and allocated days for selection on Sentral in Week 7 when this information will also be emailed to students.

Students who are successful in making a Representative team will not need to select a sport on the dates above.

A wide variety of venue sports and school sports are again on offer to our students, with the inclusion of Cables Waterpark which incurs a weekly cost of \$12.
