# **Assistant Principal**

In Week 5 we celebrated 'Social Justice Week' at Emmaus. This week came about because four Year 8 students decided they wanted to raise awareness of different issues such as the environment, the plight of refugees, individuality, bullying and mental health. Charlee Rose Murtough-Coombes, Lilliana Purnell, Grace Simpson and Sandy Shakkal are to be commended on their initiative and passion to make a difference in the lives of others.

As part of this week, Sandy has written the following reflection and is to be commended on her courage and bravery to do so:

#### Reflections on my refugee experience by Sandy Shakkal (Year 8)

I can't remember most of my childhood, except for two memories. The first memory was when I was sitting on my parents' bed; my sister was crying her heart out next to me, my younger brother was jumping on the bed not knowing what was going on, and my parents were outside on the balcony, watching the police officers outside search the car that had been sitting there for a couple of months for a hidden bomb.

My second memory was when I was out on the balcony on my favourite wooden swing, and when I looked out into the distance, a dark cloud of smoke emerged from behind the buildings and filled the sky.

I can't remember my life in Syria too well, but I do remember moving to Australia. My parents decided that it was best for us to move so that my siblings and I could have a good life, and a better future. I remember when we arrived and went to my uncle's house; he had all of my cousins there waiting to meet us, only problem was, I couldn't communicate with any of them. I started school not too long after that. It took me three terms to learn a whole new language and I was pleased. My parents then decided to surprise us with a baby that would soon become my brother.

After I had finished Year 4, my parents found a nice house for our family of six, and we moved in! It took us a while to settle down and it felt weird not jumping down from my bunk bed every morning. I soon started Year 5, then went to Year 6 and then high school. I've been through a lot in my life and I've never had it easy. Just imagine sleeping every night and hearing gunshots outside on the street? This war has been going on for 8 years and approximately 400,000 people have died since and it is estimated that more than 3 million people have fled from Syria to other countries such as Lebanon (1.1 million), Jordan (600,000) and Turkey (800,000).

I've never had it easy in my life and I've had to go through pretty rough times, but I knew that by having refugee day at school during Social Justice Week, I could raise awareness about this social justice issue to everyone and hopefully you'll keep in mind that there are families that continue to live with almost nothing at all.


