UNIFORM, GROOMING AND COLLEGE STANDARDS

I stress the importance of these standards for uniform and grooming as non-negotiables as our students are our best advertisement. To that end I remind the school community of our policies and expectations as posted on our College website and would ask that all families support us at all times as responsible decision makers for our young students.

COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE INFORMATION AND APPLICATION FOR LEAVE FOR STUDENTS

A reminder that in **NSW school attendance is compulsory for children over the age of six years until the minimum school leaving age of 17 years**. Students must complete Year 10 and after Year 10, until they turn 17 years of age, students must be: in school or registered for home schooling, or in approved education or training (e.g. TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship) in full-time, paid employment (average 25 hours per week) or in a combination of work, education and/or training.

Additionally, <u>Applications for exemption</u>: if you consider that it is in your child's best interests to be exempted from the legal requirement to attend school for any length of time (one day or more), you must apply to the Principal for an exemption letter. The school will provide an **Application for Exemption from Attendance at School Form**, and assist you to complete it, if necessary. The Principal will consider your application and decide whether to grant a Certificate of Exemption.

Please note this exemption form can be collected from the Front Office or downloaded from the College Website.

It would be my expectation that these exemptions particularly for holiday purposes outside of normal holiday breaks would NOT occur and namely not in Year 11 and 12 due to the crucial nature of missing learnings for the HSC.

Can I remind parent/carers that **ATTENDANCE** each day, every day and being on time all the time, is paramount to ensure academic success. The Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta has set a target/standard for all schools once again of <u>90% attendance by 90% of students</u> in 2018 and this will certainly be the goal for Emmaus.

In 2018 as a College we were just on 75% a huge improvement on 2017 by almost 5% but still needing attention as every school day missed is learning outcomes being lost. I would ask parent/carers to be on top of attendance, know their son/daughter's whereabout each day and refrain from giving into requests from our youngsters for 'days off' for reasons other than significant illness.

I have indicated to all the Homeroom teachers to make calls home to the parent/carers of their classes as a means of introduction and of being the first port of call should they need any support, including attendance dialogue/ conversations should this become an issue.

My message to the staff for the start of 2019 as it was in 2018 is to know the story of your student and I used the following quote to reinforce our work in 2019: <u>'It is good to know the content; It is great to know the pedagogy, It is imperative to know the student'</u>.

STAFF CARPARK REMINDER

Can I also remind all parent/carers of the importance of not entering the staff carpark at any time for drop-offs, pickups, to attend the Uniform Shop or the Office at the start and finish of the day, the busiest of periods. All vehicles should remain outside the school grounds or utilise the large carpark near Trinity to ensure safety for all our community. I would be devastated to ever have to inform a family that a serious accident had occurred in the carpark involving a member(s) of our community. Please spare yourself the embarrassment of being told to turn around as you enter the staff carpark where we will have the area roped off in coming weeks and manned by our maintenance men and Business Manager. Thanks again for your support and understanding around this but as you know we are a huge community and congestion and traffic can build up very quickly causing possible dangers.

Finally, can I thank you for entrusting your children to our care and I wish you the very best for 2019 and ask you to always feel confident in contacting the College or teachers/staff directly at any time should you require assistance.


YEAR 7

Year 7 started the year by developing their skills in the Science Laboratory. Students had some practical experience with some of the more common apparatus that they will became familiar with over the next few weeks. The favourite is always the Bunsen Burner. All Year 7 students must display competency with the Bunsen Burner before receiving their license.




YEAR 9

Year 9 were challenged to construct and wire a model building according to specific requirements. They worked in pairs and were provided with the materials needed to successfully meet this challenge.



YEAR 10

Year 10 undertook a major research task and worked on a Global Issues Research Project. The Science faculty put together an iBook to provide students with a variety of problems which the students can select to tackle. Students were given the option to look at a problem in teams before coming up with their own first hand investigation to collect data.



YEAR 11

Year 11 Biology students were fortunate to conduct a field study at Penrith Lakes to put into practice what they had learned in class. Students were also taught about abiotic factors, how to measure them using state-of-the-art technology and were quizzed about their effects on the ecosystem.





During the time at the Detention Basin, our Year 11 students were lucky to have the opportunity to undertake techniques such as dip netting to try to catch some invertebrates.

The students returned to the Education Centre, where they collaboratively analysed their data, learned about the adaptations of animals such as Gambusia as well as food chains and food webs.

A very big thank you to Mr. Ashdown, Mrs. Corbin, Mr. Halpin, Mrs. Luke, Miss Martin, Mr. Tabone and Mr. Webster for their professional and enthusiastic Science teaching. I would also like to thank Mrs. Finlayson for her assistance in laboratory and practical lesson preparation and faculty administration.

As we look forward to more scientific excitement in 2019, we welcome Mr. Campbell to the Science faculty and also wish Mr. Halpin all the very best as his Emmaus journey comes to a close and he takes up the position as Leader of Learning – Science at Xavier Catholic College at Llandilo. Waiver Forms - all students participating in Flipout, Cables and Gym/Fitness should have collected a waiver on Monday of Week 2 (4th February). This is a compulsory requirement of the venue and failure to return this on Thursday for Sport in Week 1 will result in failure to participate from the venue.

SCHOOL SPORTS - Basketball/Netball, Soccer, Touch Football, Bushwalking, Music, CAPA, Theatre Sport

CAPA has a minimal applicable cost due to your son/daughter's Sport teacher in the first 2 weeks. These small costs allow us to continue providing the necessary equipment and resources for this Sport to be operational.

It is an expectation that all students in Years 7-10 attend Sport of a Thursday afternoon. This is not a time that can be used for students to leave school and/or attend appointments.

If there is a pressing reason where a student is unable to attend their allocated Sport, a note is to be provided to and signed by their Leader of Wellbeing. Our College office staff require this to allow students to sign out.

In Week 8 of each Term students select a new Sport for the following Term.

In Week 7, students are notified of their allocated day to select a Sport. Students are aware that no students are permitted to change Sports so it's important they discuss their selections with their friends and parents prior to selection. All venue Sports have an applicable weekly cost and by a student selecting this as their chosen sport they are making a commitment to bringing this money weekly to avoid attending community service. As per College Sport procedures, any student who forgets their money must see myself and will attend Community Service. Attending Community Service twice in one Term results in an afternoon detention and the potential of losing the privilege of attending their chosen Sport.

SWIMMING CARNIVAL

On another note, our College Swimming Carnival is rapidly approaching in Week 3; Friday 15th February. This is a compulsory school day and a day that is significant to our College community. Rivalry between houses is building and this is just one of many days on our school calendar where students are provided with the opportunity to really feel connected and a part of their House group whilst earning points toward our inaugural House cup.
