

Our **Staff Development Day** on the first day back supports this commitment to engagement having had a focus on blended learning, taking onboard the best parts of what we gleaned from the lockdown/remote learning period, with regards to online and face to face learning and teaching. We have set up student focus groups also to inform us as to what they enjoyed and what worked best and the feedback from our young people has been simply awesome, much of which we are utilising in our classrooms.

I take this opportunity to especially **praise our Year 12 cohort** who effectively have one term left of their formal schooling, they are working so hard and I know they will be rewarded for their grit and determination in what for them has been a really tough year-we continue to keep them in our thoughts and prayers.

Unfortunately many upcoming large school events such as excursions, retreats, camps, assemblies and gatherings remain on hold in Term 3 as directed by CEDP/NSW Health for obvious reasons, however we will do everything in our power to re-schedule and to improvise to make things work for our students, knowing though that some traditional events may look different to the way they were previously. We will continue to communicate changes, postponements or cancellations as things unfold.

I appreciate the understanding of the entire community and particularly the students who are getting on with business and only focusing on the things they can control (as one student said to me recently). To that end I am also very grateful to the staff who continually manage changes to programs at this time without complaint and who also act not only as teachers but as mentors and coaches for our students during times of high anxiety.

Some information around what I consider to be an alarming new trend in our society

I was alarmed in the recent holidays to learn about a relatively new phenomenon called vaping and how large numbers of young people are experimenting with it, not knowing the consequences. I thought as a parent I would like to know more, and it is for this reason I share some information with you below. Vaping involves the inhaling of a vapor created by an electronic cigarette (e-cigarette) or another vaping device. E-cigarettes are battery-powered smoking devices. They have cartridges filled with a liquid that usually contains nicotine, flavourings, and chemicals. The liquid is heated into a vapor, which the person inhales. That is why using e-cigarettes is called "vaping."

There are health effects of vaping?

Vaping has not been around long enough for us to know how it affects the body over time, however health experts are reporting serious lung damage in people who vape, including some deaths already in Australia and worldwide.

Why should people who vape quit? - Here are some reasons:

Unknown health effects: The long-term health consequences of vaping are not known. Recent studies report serious lung damage in people who vape, and even some deaths.

Addiction: Addiction in the growing brain may set up pathways for later addiction to other substances.

Brain risks: Nicotine affects brain development in kids and teens. This can make it harder to learn and concentrate. Some of the brain changes are permanent and can affect mood and impulse control later in life.

Use of other tobacco products: Studies show that vaping makes it more likely that someone will try other tobacco products, like regular cigarettes, cigars, hookahs, and smokeless tobacco.

Toxins (poisons): The vapor made from e-cigarettes is **not** made of water. The vapor contains harmful chemicals and very fine particles that are inhaled into the lungs and exhaled into the environment.

Sports: To do their best in sports. Vaping may lead to lung inflammation (irritation).

Money: Vaping is expensive! The cost of the cartridges over time starts to add up. Instead, someone could spend that money on other things that they need or enjoy.

Please know that vaping at school is banned and indeed considered a prohibited and illegal item amongst students.

New program a relief for students

he Federal Government's new \$2 billion JobTrainer skills package is yet another puzzle piece in the country's economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The new \$1 billion JobTrainer program will provide 340,700 places from Septem-ber for free or low cost vocational training courses available for graduating students and those who have found themselves without work as a result of the pandemic. The Federal Government will provide

\$500 million, with matched contributions

from state and territory governments.

The other half of the package will go towards extending wage subsidies for currently employed apprentices and

traines.
Emmaus Catholic College Principal
Robert Nastasi said the announcement of the JobTrainer program came as a huge relief to many of the year 12 students at the

"There's a lot of anxiety amongst them already, so essentially it is a bit of security to break that anxiety to know that there is a pathway for them," he said. "We get a lot of students with early entry

NICOLA BARTON to university but this is like an early entry for trades and nursing for those who don't want to go to university." Vice Captain and Colyton resident Chan-

telle Gordon was recently named a finalist in the schools category of the 2020 NSW Training Awards.

She is a huge advocate for VET subjects

in schools and said the scheme alleviates the pressure on students after a stressful final year. "We have a lot of support from our teach-

ers and from our families and friends; everyone's really feeling for us," she said. "I think this JobTrainer scheme just really shows that the government cares about us and that people are thinking of

us."

Ms Gordon said having this security takes the stress off those who don't want

to attend university.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said the JobTrainer package was focused on

getting people into jobs.

"JobTrainer will ensure more Australians have the chance to reskill or upskill to fill the jobs on the other side of this crisis,'

he said.

"The jobs and skills we'll need as we come out of the crisis are not likely to be the same as those that were lost.'

Are you new to webinars?

Here's some helpful information on what a webinar is, how to join, and what you can expect.

What is a webinar? A webinar is a presentation held over the internet whereby a host can share information with an audience. The advantage of a webinar is that you can view the presentation from the comfort of your own home or workplace.

What do I need to join a webinar? First and foremost, you'll need an internet connection along with a device such as a computer, laptop or iPad, with sound. There's no need for a microphone or camera as the presenter will not be able to see or hear you. If you're hosting a large group, you'll need a large enough screen so your audience can see the presentation. It's also recommended that Google Chrome is used as your internet browser.

I have registered but cannot connect to the session - Shortly before the webinar you will be sent an email containing a "Join Webinar" button. Click on this to attend the presentation. You should plan on attending the presentation about 5 minutes before it is scheduled to start to make sure you don't miss anything. GoToWebinar should guide you through the setup process smoothly at this point - If it does not, there are a few things you can check:

Potential reasons/solutions:

- If you have a personal or network firewall, make sure that GoToMeeting/GoToWebinar is not being blocked.
- If this is the first time you're attending a webinar through GoToMeeting/GoToWebinar, and the application does not launch after you click "Join Webinar" (if you don't see the GoToWebinar control panel), look for the "launch software" button on the page.
- If you are still having trouble, try using a different browser (Internet Explorer, Firefox, Safari, or Chrome), and click "Join Webinar" again.

I missed the webinar. Can I be emailed the link to a recording?

Potential reasons/solutions: - To ensure quality control and to protect the IP of our sessions we do not record our sessions or have them available upon request. You will need to look out for the next available session. Check the website for dates.

I can't register for a session or the session isn't showing up when I select the drop-down menu.

Potential reasons/solutions: The session may be full. We have a limit of 100 attendees per session to ensure the quality of the content is not compromised by connection speeds and the facilitator can manage and interact with the majority of the participants. Please contact outreach@esafety.gov.au and we will inform you of the next release of sessions.

I have logged in and can see the presentation but cannot interact or chat.

Potential reasons/solutions:

- If you have connected to the session using a smart phone or tablet the chat function is not available on GoToWebinar sessions. Please try changing to a PC or Laptop.
- The facilitator or webinar assistant may need to enable the chat function for each participant, and this may take a few minutes after you log in.

I have logged in and can see the presentation but cannot hear anything.

Potential reasons/solutions:

- Check your audio settings on your device or webinar tool (have you muted the presenter?
- Make sure that you have clicked the "Use Mic and Speakers" option under the Audio section in the GoToWebinar control panel.
- Do you have the audio device plugged in or connected to bluetooth? Check the audio settings and run a test with another website or song.
- Check your speakers themselves sometimes the connection to your computer can come loose and make sure that they are on (try adjusting the volume as well).
- Log out and log back in to the webinar session. Sometimes the connection to the session hasn't worked properly.

I have logged in but can't see the presenter's screen.

Potential reasons/solutions:

- Try using another browser (Internet Explorer, Firefox, Safari, or Chrome), and click "Join Webinar" again.
- Check the time: webinars usually start shortly after the scheduled time, so wait until you hear the presenter's voice or a few minutes have passed since the start time before leaving the session.
- HoldAlt+TabonaPC(orCommand+TabonaMac)andselectthe GoToMeeting/GoToWebinar application to make sure that it is not minimized or covered by another window.

2020 Topics

You may choose ONE of the following topics:

- Discuss with your parents/family to identify a family link to an Australian soldier then research that person's life. Your research should cover his/her pre-service life, service training, overseas service, post-service life and issues (good and bad). Present your research and **your views** about his/her involvement, in a way that best illustrates his/her commitment to Australia's part in the war effort.
- Able Seaman Edward (Teddy) Sheean perished with the sinking of HMAS Armidale in the Pacific Ocean on 1st December 1942 during World War 2. Who was Teddy Sheean? Describe the event which took Teddy's life and detail his heroic action. *In your view*, should Teddy Sheean receive any meritorious award for his actions (give reasons)? If so, what do you think would be an appropriate award?
- In recent years Australia has been involved in a number of conflicts including <u>Iraq and Afghanistan</u>. Choose one, then research to determine if Australia's involvement was valued by our Coalition Forces. Was our military involvement accepted and supported by Australians generally? Why do you support (or NOT support) your research outcomes?
- Sandakan. Seventy-seven years ago, after the fall of Singapore, 2,700 Allied POWs
 (mainly Australian & some British) were sent by their Japanese captors to Sabah, Borneo
 to construct a military airfield with their bare hands at Sandakan. By mid-1945, all but 6
 had died at the hands of illness and their Japanese captors. How did this come about?
 Imagine yourself as a descendant of a Sandakan victim can you reconcile with their
 captor's nation today?
- Author a poem, design a visual display, or conduct research that best reflects your thoughts/feelings about the experiences of <u>Australian P.O.W.'s</u>. The work should focus on the WWII era. Present your research and your views about such experiences in a way that best illustrates the experiences of Australians. Your work must include an addendum (a written explanation) to illustrate what caused you to choose this topic and what were the ideas that your poem/display is trying to display.
